Tracing the history, influence + changes of the Blues throughout music genres

Local musician and music legend Daryl Davis believes the Blues is the most influential music in the world. "All music has the same notes, the difference is in how we assemble them," he says.

Davis traced the history of the Blues and its influential role in music for about 100 enthusiastic Blues fans last month at the kick-off to the 9th Annual Silver Spring Blues Festival. Using videos, recordings and playing his keyboard, Davis demonstrated the various styles of music for which the Blues laid a foundation.

"It's gospel without the lyrics, the Blues emanates from the musical and emotional improvisation experienced during slavery." From vintage footage of Sister Rosetta Tharpe playing "This Train," Davis showed how the melody's similarities in notation and rhythm passed to Elvis Presley, Chuck Berry's "Sweet Little 16" and even the Beach Boys' "Surfin' USA."

"Gospel and Blues are the same music," he told the group. "What differentiates them is the lyrics." Without copyright protections and

ways to preserve and record their music, Blues and Gospel pioneers saw their work shared indiscriminately and changed significantly into other genres.

The relationship between country music and the Blues is also close, said Davis. Hank Williams learned to play guitar from Rufus "Tee Tot" Payne, an early African-American blues musician. Williams' classic "Your Cheatin' Heart" shares the same three-chord progressions as Blues played by Payne, with changes made in the order of the chords, the timing and the accentuation.

Davis illustrated the journey of one popular musical mainstay, Williams' 1947 "Move It On Over." The 12-bar Blues song was his first major country hit and is considered an early example of rockabilly. Its composition closely resembled Blind Blake's 1929 "Diddie Wa Diddie." A few years after Williams' hit, Bill Haley and the Comets' "Rock Around the Clock" resurrected the same musical structure. "Move It On Over" later became a 1980s rock 'n roll hit for George Thorogood and the Delaware

Destroyers, and then came full circle as a hit for country star Travis Tritt in the 1990s.

The introduction of a strong backbeat by Chuck Berry transformed the Blues into rock 'n roll, Davis said. Accentuating the second and fourth beats injected a higher level of energy into a song, generating more excitement.

Davis, who played keyboards and toured with Berry, considers "Maybelline" to be an early example of the complete rock 'n roll package: youthful subject, guitar-driven arrangement, easily understood lyrics and high-energy excitement. Written in 1955, "Maybelline" was adapted from a western swing tune, "Ida Red," yet another example of the transformation from one genre to another.

"The Blues is in the DNA of all those genres," says Davis. "There is a big difference between singing a Blues song and singing the Blues. The feeling has to emote through the music, that's what makes it the Blues."

The free 9th Annual Silver Spring Blues Festival is Saturday, June 17, preceded by a Blues Week filled with activities and concerts. For details, see the ad on page 7.





Hard Swimmin' Fish: A Blues-centered True Believer

Acme Blues Company, a former Northern Virginia group that included harmonica player and vocalist Waverly Milor, once described themselves as 'Industrial Strength Blues." Such a description might be applied to Milor's present group, Hard

Swimmin' Fish, also based in Northern and Central Virginia. Its other members are Demian Lewis on guitar, banjo and vocals; Randy Ball on bass; and Jason Walker on drums and percussion. On their latest self-produced album, *True Believer*, they are supported by the organ of John Sharrar on one selection.

On their website, they describe themselves, "Hard Swimmin' Fish is an ensemble deeply rooted in the traditions of American music. Our down home roots sound pilfers from the best that early American music has to offer including blues, jazz, funk and swing, and churn it all up into a spicy brew that is familiar yet uniquely our own." Listening to this latest release, one is struck by the blues center of the performances and the impressive ensemble playing that overshadows the instrumental solos which are quick and to the point.

The tenor of their sound is set with the insistent, machine-like groove of the opening title song as Milor gruffly delivers the lyrics of being a true believer tied to the stake with his overdubbed harmonica adding feel of the performance. Plenty of grit follows on "Five Years Hard Labor," with its chugging rhythm and his being let go from his job for his five years of hard labor and having his woman walk out the door. "Come Together" is not the Beatles number, but a Lewis original with him laying down some hot acoustic slide guitar set against a tight groove. Covers include a straight, rocking treatment of Howlin' Wolf's "Howlin' For My Darling;" an atmospheric reworking of Little Willie John's classic "Need Your Love So Bad," with one of the nicest vocals on this and organ from Sharrar; and a warp speed rendition of the



classic Ray Charles stomp "Mess Around."

A traditional gospel number, "Don't Let the Devil Ride" which segues into "Wish I Was In Heaven Sitting Down," closes out this latest release that perhaps exhibits why
